IGNITING INNOVATION AT SPARC TANK

People from around the state of Maryland passionate about supporting people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) gathered together in mid-November to celebrate innovative projects designed to benefit the community. Around 100 people showed up to The Arc Maryland's SpArc Tank Ig-Nite event.

It was the fifth year for the SpArc Tank program which brings together prospective projects to compete for funding from The Arc Maryland's Board. Over this time more than \$100,000 has been provided and over 10,000 people have been supported through creative and cutting-edge projects.

For The Arc Montgomery County, it was our first time pitching! Chief Development Officer Stephanie Benedetti and Director of Children & Youth Services Doreen Engel took to the stage for five minutes to share their vision: an in-person digital literacy boot camp for teens with IDD.

Being online and part of the digital world is essential to the modern human experience and one that everyone deserves. Unfortunately, while digital literacy and safety are often taught in schools, teens with IDD are often left out of that

education. Thanks to the funding awarded through SpArc Tank, in summer 2024, The Arc Montgomery County will be offering a series of classes for these teens and preteens, ensuring they have the knowledge base to access the digital world in a safe and empowered way. The classes will be led by Dr. Mary Jo Krile, assistant professor at Eastern Kentucky University and digital literacy advocate.

"Teens with IDD want this access. There's been lots of research, the biggest was recently done across Europe, in five different countries with a very big pooling sample. What is the number one thing teens with IDD want? A phone," said Doreen during the pitch. "Our project is designed to give that to them safely and then replicate what we have put together for schools, teens, and their families across the country. Because I think we can argue that if you don't have access to technology, the internet, and social media, how can you actually be included in our modern society?"

Stephanie and Doreen wowed the judges and were awarded \$5,000 – full funding! The classes are set to begin this summer and we're thrilled to see them come to life. See page 14 for more information.

Other pitches from the night included a youth mentorship program, an inclusive children's musical theater company, and an initiative to make boards of directors more inclusive for people with disabilities.

CHILDREN & YOUTH SERVICES

Everything may look business as usual at KFICCC, but behind the scenes, big things are in the works. Compass Pro Bono, a nonprofit strategic consulting firm, has agreed to work with The Arc Montgomery County, offering free consultations with their team of highly-qualified business professionals where they'll be analyzing KFICCC, The Arc's inclusive childcare center.

"We know there's a need for more inclusive childcare in Montgomery County, that's well established," said Doreen Engel, Director of Children & Youth Services. "How can we respond to that need?" That's where Compass Pro Bono comes in, their team of dedicated volunteers is going to look over a series of propositions for KFICCC to establish



some framework for moving forward. Those possibilities include the evaluation of KFICCC's complex and variable funding structures to determine if there might be a more efficient model going forward. We're also curious if it would be possible to open a second location of KFICCC, so a feasibility study will be performed. Another feasibility study will determine if we might be able to establish a behavioral readiness program to prepare children for entrance into the inclusive childcare setting. We're also working together with Compass Pro Bono to explain the benefits of inclusive childcare to parents of children who are typically-developing.

"I am certainly excited," said Doreen. "When families call us and they need childcare, you're not only supporting the child, because you're providing them a wonderful childcare option that you know is going to help them thrive and grow, [the families can] enjoy their work and feel confident that their child is safe and well and learning." We're all excited by the prospect of growth and how many more children we can support.

Congratulations to classrooms one and twelve, the winners of the fall reading challenge! Between both classrooms over 500 books were read. For their victory they enjoyed a pizza party and even more books. Keep reading, KFICCC!



After All, The Arc Montgomery County's afterschool, day-off, and summer program for youth with IDD, is abuzz with the energy of advancement.

A lot is being done to work towards inclusion, making sure the youth in After All have opportunities to socialize with their peers who are typically-developing. By partnering with local private and public high schools, teens that are typicallydeveloping have been participating in activities with the youth at After All. Some are there to learn about careers in working with people with disabilities, some are there to volunteer or have fun.

The other advancement? We're making sure there are always plentiful options to be had and that the teens get to make choices of what activities they want to participate in. When the youth from one of the schools comes over with her art activity, the After All teens can decide whether or not they want to participate or they want to do something else.

On a hot summer day last year, the youth of After All gathered outside for field

day. The annual tradition brings together the youth from After All and students from St. John's High School to play a variety of games outside and enjoy good inclusive fun. One of those After All students was Faisal. Faisal, now a graduating senior, enjoyed field day after a dramatic turnaround from the year before. In 2022 Faisal stood alone and didn't participate, but in 2023 Faisal happily joined in activities. Having fun with "old friends and new," said Faisal. He shot basketball, tossed beanbags, enjoyed the rainbow parachute, and delighted in the treats from the Kona Ice truck.

With graduation on the horizon, Faisal isn't sure if he'll be there for the next field day. But the memories and friends will certainly remain with Faisal this year and on.

EMPLOYMENT & MEANINGFUL DAY SERVICES

In a wonderful testament to the quality of services provided, the Employment & Meaningful Day Services (E&MDS) program has seen a rush of new people interested in getting supports. For those interested in competitive employment, an exciting development – our new team is ready to go! Additionally, inclusive recreational opportunities are being explored and expanded thanks to a recent grant awarded to the program for \$25,000 (see page 13 for more details).

E&MDS, along with many of our other programs, have entered into a partnership with The Arc of Northern Virginia to participate in their Tech for Independent Living program. This innovative technology allows our team to access and create text, image, and video tutorials for people supported so that they have trainings of their choosing right at their fingertips, day and night.

We have adopted a road! The stretch of road between Beach Drive and Summit Ave along Cedar Lane in Kensington has been adopted by E&MDS. PERSONAL SUPPORT SERVICES





We are thrilled to welcome Adam McArthur as the new Director of Personal Supports. Adam comes to us from Community Support Services and has experience as a live-in house manager, coordinator for a personal supports department, and an assistant director of a day program. "I plan on building relationships with the people we support, their families, and the DSPs to learn what is working, what we can improve on, and to provide the best services for the people we support," said Adam. Here at The Arc, Personal Supports consists of around 40 employees who provide individualized support to 57 people. In the coming months, the department will focus on ensuring all people supported are able to access their community and that each person receives optimal support to accomplish their goals.

RESPITE COORDINATION



Since the renewal of the Respite Coordination contract with Montgomery County, there has been a significant increase in the number of families with children applying for support. We are seeing more frequent requests to use respite hours for children to participate in enriching summer camps and therapeutic programs. These opportunities provide a break for primary caregivers and offer valuable experiences and growth for the children involved. Montgomery County has approved additional funding for the Respite Coordination program to help ensure families enrolled in respite have access to their respite hours and will remove some families from the waitlist. Additionally, income restrictions have been lifted by continuing this non-means-tested approach, we can empower more families to seek respite services without financial barriers.



COMMUNITY LIVING SERVICES



A gentleman who had been receiving Personal Supports has made a smooth transition into one of our homes. He is adapting well and enjoys the company of his housemates. A DSP who had been instrumental in his Personal Supports played a crucial role and continues to provide him support to him.

Two people supported by CLS participated in Developmental Disabilities Day in Annapolis. They were thrilled to participate in in-person advocacy events again. Read more about DD Day on page 15.

Exciting developments are underway with Spirit Club. Their Founding Director recently met with the CLS team to introduce their inclusive gym and personal training program for people of all abilities, sparking the beginning of a valuable partnership. We look forward to the positive impact this partnership will bring.

A FOND FAREWELL TO URBAN THRIFT



After more than a decade of operation, Urban Thrift, The Arc Montgomery County's thrift store, has closed its doors for the final time. Despite the shelves now being empty, the store was bustling until the end.

Located on a busy street corner in Kensington, the store was a favorite among customers, offering great deals on a variety of home goods and clothing. Throughout its years of operation, Urban Thrift not only raised funds for The Arc but also became a community fixture.

One of its most significant contributions was the Transitioning Youth Retail Training Program. Launched in 2014 and running for three years, the program trained youth with IDD in retail skills. It was a three-month course comprising classroom and hands-on job training, supporting 30 to 40 people annually.

According to Joyce Taylor, Manager of Urban Thrift, the program aimed to prepare people for competitive retail environments, fostering independence and well-being. It was the only program of its kind in Maryland at the time, making a significant impact on the lives of young people with disabilities.

While Urban Thrift's closure marks the end of an era, its legacy lives on through programs like the Employment & Meaningful Day program, which prepares people with IDD for competitive employment. The store's impact will be remembered and appreciated for years to come.



TODDLER BOOGIE

After a break since 2019, Toddler Boogie made a comeback, filling KFICCC with the sounds of joy and excitement. Current and former students, siblings, and community members went from room to room, sampling the different activities offered at the fundraiser.

In the storytelling room, they sat quietly and listened. In the movie room, they watched seasonal films. In the arts and crafts room, they made cotton-ball ghosts and decorated corn-on-the-cob and autumn trees. In the sensory room, children hunted for treasure in the sensory tubs and got their faces painted. Spooky and delicious snacks lined the hallway, providing sugary bursts of energy to the night. And, in the gym, festive Halloween music played as the children played games, knocking down towers of ghosts, tossing bean bags, and playing tic tac toe with colored pumpkins.

"My favorite part was just having the children come in and enjoy themselves," said Niambi Heyward, Childcare Center Director. "Also, the last part of the Toddler Boogie, the musical chairs, where all the children had to participate. To see them laughing and having fun and dancing as they're trying to find a chair to sit in. Just seeing the parents having fun and their children having fun and just having us all come together for one event."

Everyone was there to have a good time, celebrate Halloween, and fundraise for KFICCC. A total of \$3,000 was raised, which will go a long way in helping KFICCC provide a space for children of all abilities to learn, play, and grow alongside one another.

This year, the parents took over the preparations, excitedly bringing the Toddler Boogie to life in the image of what it was in years past. There was an eagerness to return to what once was and a joyous revival of the beloved tradition. It's what brought back alumna and brought in the community.

OPPORTUNITIES ON THE RISE- THANKS TO GRANTS SECURED BY THE ARC!

Employment & Meaningful Day Services was awarded \$25,000 from a private foundation, giving us the opportunity to expand our offerings of inclusive recreational opportunities for adults with IDD. Too often we've found that recreational opportunities have been limited, and don't reflect the full range of interests and abilities of people supported. With direct input from people supported, their family members, and employees, we're challenging those limitations and seeing where the possibilities take us! Potential activities, brainstormed with people supported, include kayaking, swimming, rock climbing, sailing, and caving.

MoCo Transit awarded The Arc \$30,000 to maintain our fleet of 50 vehicles. The fleet transports about 300 people with IDD each year, averaging about 50 miles per vehicle per day, helping people



supported to get to medical appointments, recreation activities, shopping, and other places they may need to go. With a lot of usage comes a lot of associated costs: fuel, maintenance, and repairs. This grant will help offset some of those costs and make sure we can continue to safely and reliably get people where they need to go.

Children & Youth Services was awarded a total of \$8,400 from Tower Cares that provided funding to both KFICCC and After All. For KFICCC, the grant supplied new mats for physical and occupational therapies, along with new books and toys. The youth from After All will be going on field trips and are enjoying new tech, recreation equipment, puzzles, and art supplies.

DIRECT SUPPORT PROFESSIONAL CAREER LADDERING

The Arc Montgomery County is proud to announce that we have been awarded a multiyear grant from the Maryland Department of Labor to spearhead a groundbreaking project. This initiative aims to evaluate and establish a career ladder for Direct Support Professionals (DSPs) within our organization.

The primary objective of this project is to develop a comprehensive career advancement framework. This framework will provide DSPs at The Arc Montgomery County with clear pathways for career planning and progression. Starting from an entry-level position, DSPs will be guided through a microcredentialing program. This program will lead them to the highest level of mastery in their profession, with corresponding increases in compensation.

A crucial aspect of this project is the active involvement of DSPs themselves. They are key members of the working group tasked with evaluating credentialing programs and proposing the laddering framework.

The project is structured into five phases, with the completion of phase 1 and the

commencement of phase 2 already achieved. The working group, consisting of 10 DSPs, plays a pivotal role in shaping this initiative. They are compensated for their time and dedication.

As we move forward, we are excited about the possibilities this project holds for our DSPs. The ultimate goal is to create a supportive and rewarding environment that recognizes and nurtures the talent and dedication of our DSPs.

This project was funded in whole or in party by funds received from Direct Care Workforce Innovation Program, a Grant program of the Maryland Department of Labor.
